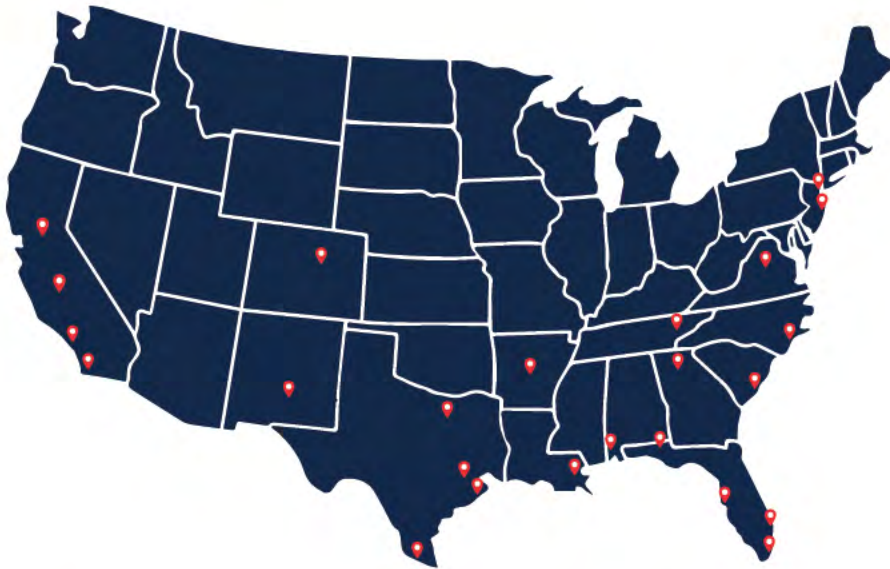

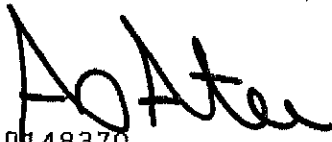

DRC conceived, executed, supervised, and funded a 150-mile Gulf of Mexico shoreline protection system in response to the BP oil spill.

DRC performed debris removal in **seven states** following the **four hurricanes** to hit the Gulf Coast in 2024: Beryl, Francine, Helene, and Milton.

Since 2020, DRC has performed **specialized private property debris removal and demolitions** following devastating wildfires in California, Colorado, Hawaii, New Mexico, and Washington State. In our ongoing wildfire response in New Mexico, we have completed hazardous site assessments, demolitions, hazardous material abatement, erosion control and debris removal on more than **800 properties**.



Subcontractors are paid every Friday, with payments covering work completed two weeks prior, ensuring consistent and timely compensation throughout the project duration.

DRC holds the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) ACI Debris Removal contract for Region 3 (MI, IN, TN, KY, OH, WV) and collaborates with USACE on training and preparations. DRC has been **tasked** four times under this contract, most recently in response to the December 2023 tornado in Hendersonville, Tennessee, and previously in response to the tornadoes in Graves County and Mayfield, Kentucky, in December 2021.

As a debris removal provider for the National Association of State Procurement Officials (NASPO), DRC is available to work with any state or local government using the NASPO contract.

CONTRACT SUMMARY

In 2021, DRC was contracted by Ascension Parish, Bayou Lafourche Water District, St. Charles Parish and Terrebonne Parish to perform waterway debris removal in response to the devastation caused by Hurricane Ida. DRC successfully removed and disposed of over 440,000 cubic yards of wet debris.

DRC removed over 18,000,000 cubic yards of debris and managed 93 debris management sites in response to Hurricane Ida alone. During this time, DRC removed over 27,000 cubic yards of debris from the levees in Terrebonne Parish. Additionally, the Southeast Flood Protection Authority contracted DRC to perform over 40,000 cubic yards of levee debris removal.

/ PROJECT SPOTLIGHT: JULY 2025 TEXAS FLOODS

In July 2025, catastrophic flooding impacted multiple counties across the State of Texas, generating unprecedented volumes of disaster-related debris and creating immediate threats to public health, safety, and access to critical infrastructure. DRC Emergency Services responded immediately, mobilizing personnel, equipment, and management resources to support urgent recovery needs across affected jurisdictions.

Within days of the event, DRC was deployed to Travis County and rapidly expanded operations statewide after being directly contracted by the Texas Department of Emergency Management (TDEM). This swift state-level engagement enabled the rapid removal of disaster debris across Kendall, Burnet, San Saba, Williamson, Kimble, Menard, Mason, and McCulloch Counties, as well as the Cities of Melvin, Brady, Leander, Jonestown, and Georgetown. All debris removal activities were executed in close coordination with local jurisdictions, TDEM, and the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ), and were fully aligned with FEMA Public Assistance eligibility requirements and applicable environmental regulations.

To support efficient collection, segregation, reduction, and final disposition, **DRC established and operated 21 Debris Management Sites (DMS)**. In addition to managing standard vegetative and construction debris streams, DRC safely handled and disposed of complex and specialty debris, including Household Hazardous Waste (HHW), waterway and water-borne debris, tires, sand and soils.

Operations were conducted across diverse geographic and operational environments, requiring rapid deployment, scalable field operations, and continuous coordination among state and local partners. DRC's ability to surge resources and adapt to evolving conditions was critical to restoring access, mitigating hazards, and accelerating recovery timelines for impacted communities. Over the course of the response, **DRC removed more than six million cubic yards of disaster-generated debris, delivering more than \$345 million in debris removal services.**



/ PROJECT SPOTLIGHT: WATERWAY DEBRIS REMOVAL

SOUTHWEST FLORIDA RESPONSE - HURRICANE IAN

DRC performed Debris Removal Services for the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and the Florida Division of Emergency Management following Hurricane Ian. The scope included the removal of roadway debris, private property debris, commercial property debris, demolition of private and commercial properties, and vehicle/vessel removal from both land and waterways. A **total of 4 DMS sites** were utilized for this operation.

DRC utilized a **total of 20 extraction/offloading sites** during this project. We used a variety of techniques involving barges, helicopters, large crane machinery, and handpicking in the removal of debris and vessels. Handpicking of debris was performed on interior marsh and mangrove lands where barges and trucks could not gain access. **Over 100 vehicles and vessels** were removed during this project.

DRC completed debris removal services on **412 right of entry (ROE) properties**. This work involved 157 demolitions, 54 of which were on properties containing asbestos.

DRC kept in daily contact with subcontractors and the State to coordinate the simultaneous provision of services including demolition, ROE, household hazardous waste collection, waterway activities, helicopter operations, meal services, hazardous tree removal, and more.

DRC removed and disposed of **more than five million cubic yards** of debris during this operation, with a contract value of **over \$350 million**. We **recycled 100% of the 3.3 million cubic yards of vegetative debris** collected in Sarasota County, Florida, and surrounding municipalities.



/ PORT OF CORPUS CHRISTI AUTHORITY – HURRICANE HARVEY

CONTRACT SUMMARY

In 2018, the Port of Corpus Christi Authority contacted DRC Emergency Services to activate our existing standby debris removal contract. Hurricane Harvey had left debris scattered throughout the Port at varying depths.

The Port Authority issued DRC a list of more than 120 debris targets, including GPS coordinates. DRC used survey boats with GPS and sonar technologies to locate the debris, then guided barges with grapple buckets to the debris.

Much of the debris was in deep water, so DRC had to deploy dive teams to locate the debris and hoist it to the surface.

We hauled the debris to offload sites located along the coastline, then transported it to nearby landfills or recycling facilities.

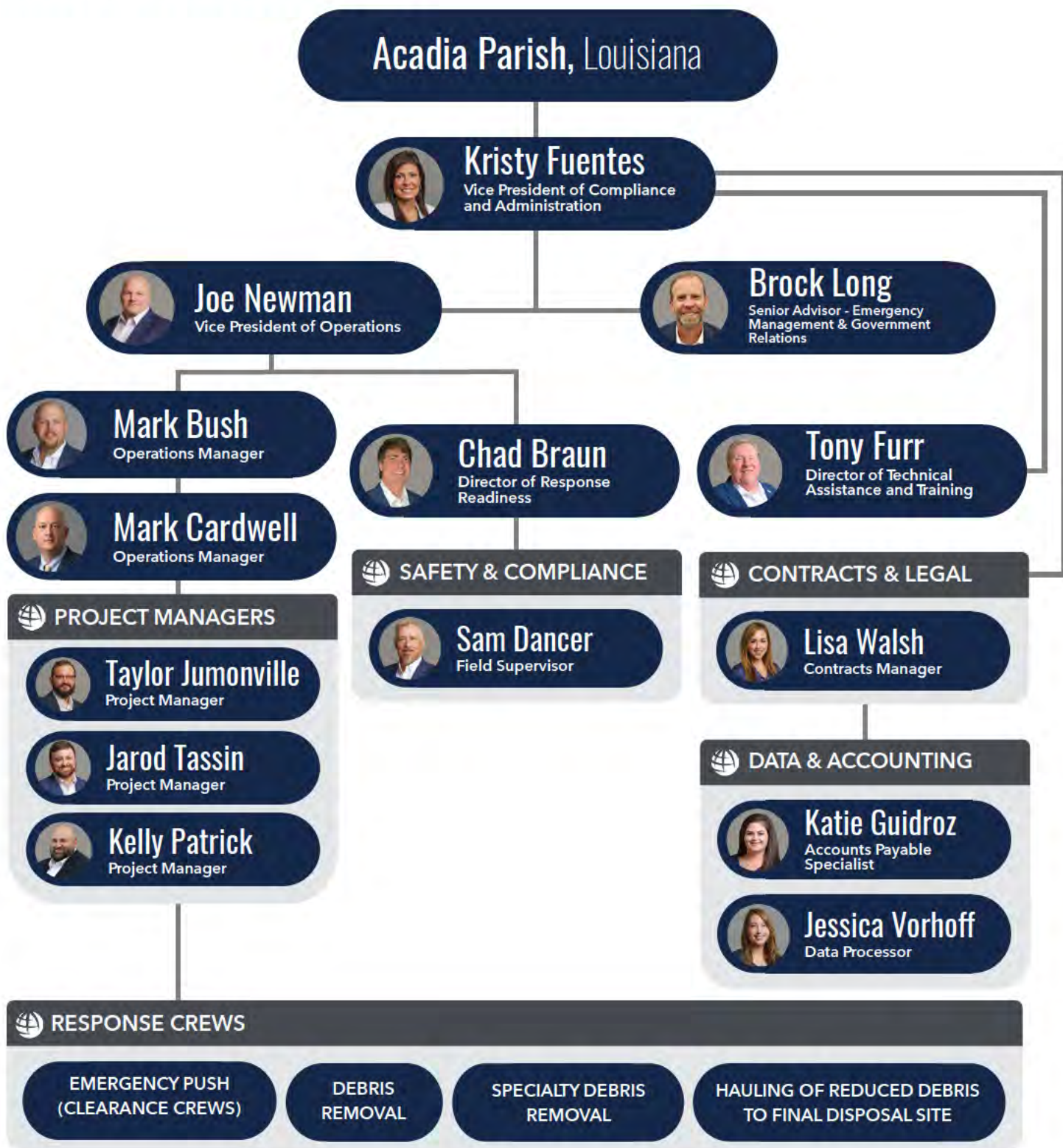

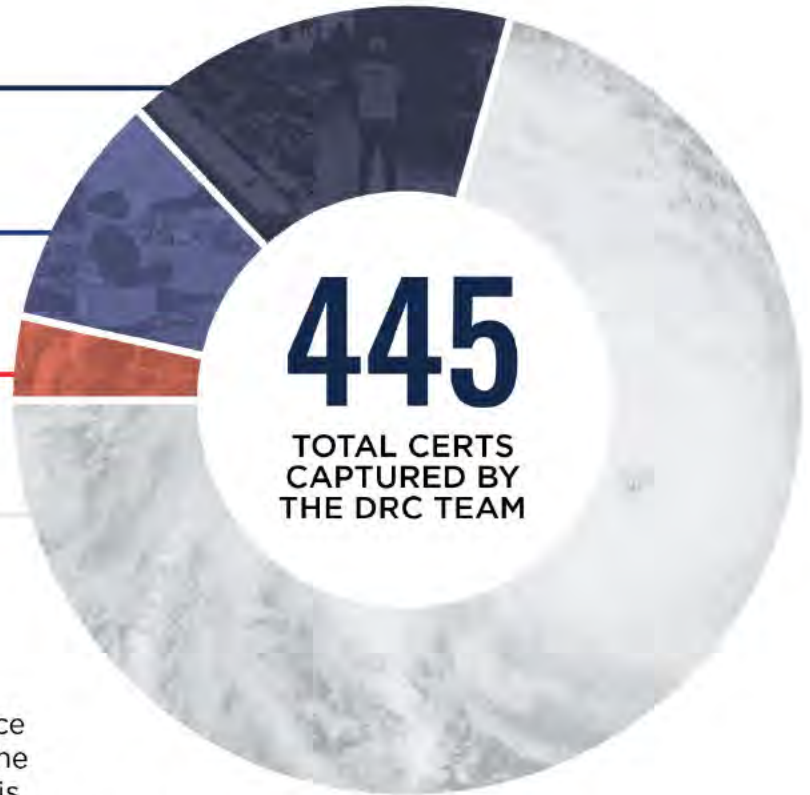

STANDARDS AND OVERSIGHT

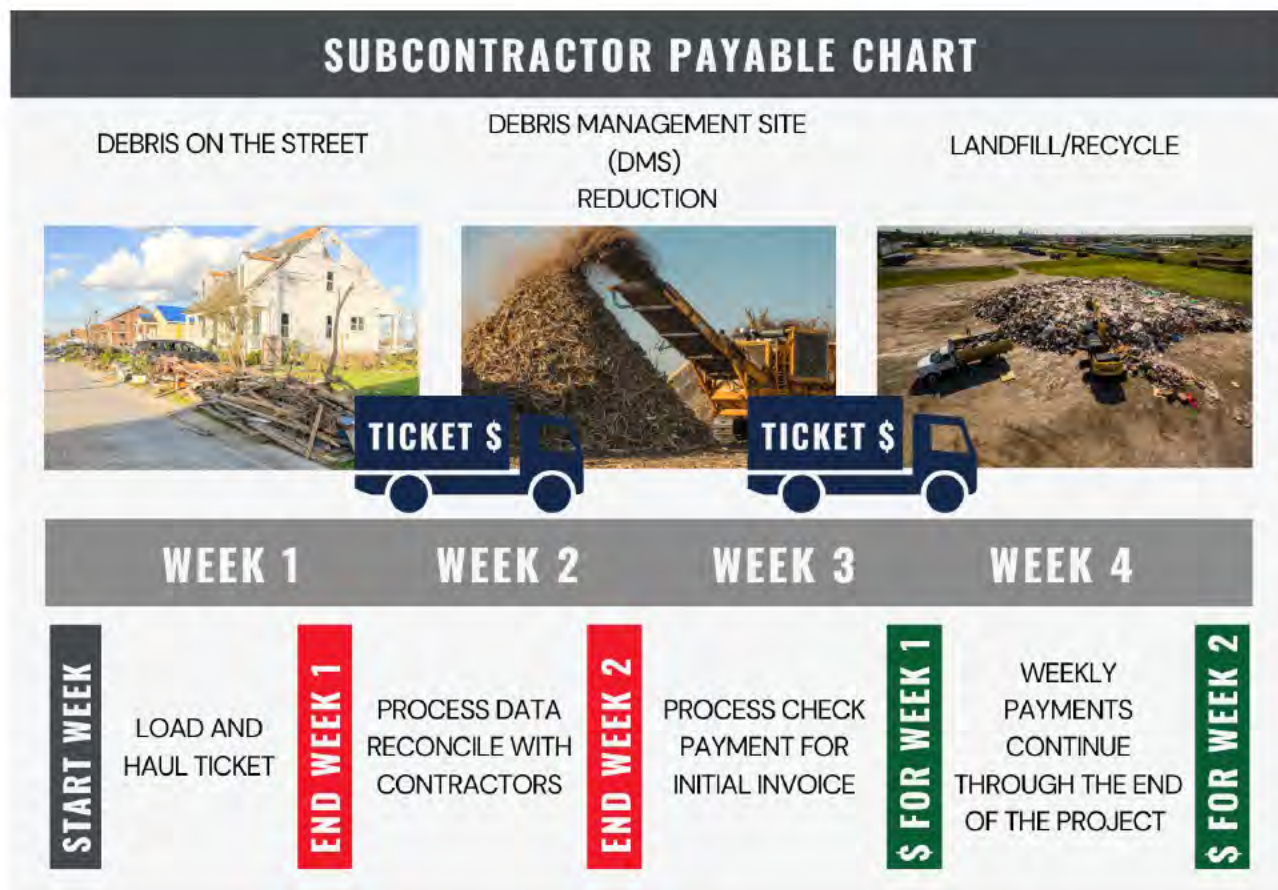

Regular monitoring through site inspections, performance reviews, and daily progress reports helps maintain quality control and address any subcontractor issues proactively. DRC's strong relationships with subcontractors are built on trust and accountability, which not only improves workflow

coordination but also reduces risk, enhances safety compliance, and ensures that debris removal operations meet client and regulatory standards.

As an extension of DRC, subcontractors are held to the same environmental regulations and compliance standards that we are, further ensuring the success and efficacy of our contract with Acadia Parish.

/ STAFFING CAPACITY

Since its inception, the DRC team has responded to major natural and man-made disasters across the United States. All assigned personnel will be available to the Parish as needed. Personnel are NIMS-certified with specialized training in safety and asbestos management, and are equipped with vehicles, multi-state communications, and handheld computers to ensure successful disaster response and management.

DRC employs more than 30 Regional and Project Managers assigned to specific geographic locations nationwide, available to mobilize for large-scale disasters anywhere in the country. Kristy Fuentes, the Regional Manager/point of contact for Acadia Parish, is available to respond to the needs of the Parish 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

DRC employs approximately 60 full-time professionals with backgrounds in Civil Engineering, Construction Science, Forestry, and more. Our management team includes former U.S. Army Rangers, a former FEMA Public Assistance/Debris Task Force Lead, and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Emergency Operations Leaders. With over 20 years managing FEMA-declared disasters, DRC's personnel are uniquely positioned to provide debris relief for communities nationwide.

/ ABILITY TO MANAGE MULTIPLE CONTRACTS

DRC has extensive experience staffing, managing, and executing multiple debris management and emergency response projects nationwide. Our approach is grounded in using highly qualified operational management teams to ensure a coordinated, expeditious and effective response to disasters. DRC's management staff is provided with state-of-the-art resource planning and forecasting systems and empowered to reassign resources as needed. DRC's experience managing multiple contracts includes the following:

2026 Winter Ice Storms and Floods



DRC was activated in multiple counties in Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee, Virginia, and South Carolina following Winter Storm Fern that devastated those areas. We have removed close to 500,000 cubic yards of debris so far.



We have also cleaned up debris following the 2026 flooding in Hawaii.

2025 Floods, Wildfires, and Tornadoes

2025 was a year of multiple, varied disasters with a wide geographical spread across the country.



DRC was activated by the Texas Division of Emergency Management in nine counties and nine cities following the devastating flooding that affected the Texas Hill Country in July 2025. We removed more than 6,000,000 cubic yards of debris from Texas communities. Additionally, we responded to flooding events in Kentucky, Tennessee, and New Mexico.



We began a new phase of work in response to the 2024 wildfires and flooding in New Mexico, and we have begun work on the Airport Fire in California.



We have also cleaned up debris following tornadoes in Mississippi, Missouri, Kentucky, Texas, and Tennessee (for the USACE).

2024 Hurricane Season and Wildfires



Four hurricanes – Beryl, Francine, Helene, and Milton – struck the Gulf Coast in a very active 2024 season. DRC was activated on 22 contracts for Beryl, 15 for Francine, 27 for Helene, and 27 for Milton. Helene and Milton were both record-breaking major hurricanes which struck Florida less than 2 weeks apart. DRC's hurricane response work in 2024 spanned seven states from Texas to Virginia and involved the use of 151 DMS sites.



DRC performed specialized private property debris removal in response to wildfires in New Mexico, Washington State, and Hawaii.

2023 Tornadoes, Winter Storms, Wildfires, and Hurricane Idalia



DRC was activated in 40 jurisdictions, managed 13 DMS sites, and removed and disposed of over 2,600,000 cubic yards of debris.

2022 Hurricane Ian



DRC was activated in 20 jurisdictions, managed 21 DMS sites, and removed and disposed of over 5,000,000 cubic yards of debris.

2021 Hurricane Ida



DRC was activated in 45 jurisdictions, managed 93 DMS sites, and removed and disposed of over 18,000,000 cubic yards of debris.

2020 Hurricane Season



DRC was activated in 55 jurisdictions, managed 75 temporary staging and reduction sites, and removed and disposed of over 6,000,000 cubic yards of debris in response to six hurricanes across seven states.

2019 Hurricane Season



DRC was activated in 14 jurisdictions in the Gulf Coast region as Hurricanes Barry and Dorian and Tropical Storm Imelda hit the coast back-to-back over two months. DRC operated and managed five temporary staging and reduction sites in total and removed approximately 210,000 cubic yards of debris.

2018 Hurricane Season



DRC was active in nine jurisdictions in response to Hurricane Michael, where we managed 33 debris management sites and removed approximately 5,850,000 cubic yards of debris.



DRC was concurrently activated in 15 jurisdictions following Hurricane Florence, where we managed 31 temporary staging and reduction sites and picked up approximately 2,500,000 cubic yards of debris.

2017 Hurricane Season



DRC was activated by the Department of Transportation and Public Works in Puerto Rico following Hurricane Maria. During this contract, DRC managed 13 temporary staging and reduction sites and removed over 1,100,000 cubic yards of debris.



Following Hurricane Irma, DRC was activated in 27 jurisdictions simultaneously while managing 27 temporary staging and reduction sites. DRC removed and disposed of over 3,600,000 cubic yards of debris.



DRC was activated in 23 jurisdictions following Hurricane Harvey and simultaneously ran 16 debris management sites during this activation. DRC recovered and reduced over 4,700,000 cubic yards of debris during this activation.

2016 Louisiana Severe Flooding



DRC removed 2,100,000 cubic yards of debris – including 1,000,000 cubic yards which we picked up over the course of just 30 days in East Baton Rouge Parish, Louisiana.



DRC opened and operated two temporary staging and reduction sites – including the largest debris management site on record – to compact and recycle C&D debris prior to haul out for final disposal. These sites operated with such efficiency that FEMA and the USACE filmed the operation to use in training sessions.

AVAILABLE EQUIPMENT

DRC will use owned equipment, subcontractor equipment, and/or lease/rent equipment based upon the disaster scenario. **DRC has the most expansive collection of rolling stock and equipment in the disaster services industry.** The company has 2,568 trucks and 1,657 pieces of support equipment, either owned or under agreement, available for immediate use. As part of the company's Corporate Mobilization Plan, a monthly inventory of available equipment is performed, recorded, and readily available. DRC has actively demonstrated the ability to quickly amass and mobilize significant quantities of equipment. **During the 2021 hurricane season, DRC operated more than 4,000 pieces of equipment simultaneously while responding to Hurricane Ida.**

Additionally, DRC has Master Service Agreements in place with national equipment suppliers, such as Herc, Sunbelt, Bottom Line, United, Caterpillar, William Scotsman, etc., to supplement our equipment needs.

SPECIALTY EQUIPMENT

DRONES AND UNMANNED AERIAL VEHICLES (UAVS)



When authorized by the Parish, DRC will utilize drone (UAV) flights to support right-of-way patrols and supplement our ability to identify areas within the scope of the project that require debris management. UAVs help us quickly and safely assess inaccessible areas, confirm vegetation encroachments, and document hangers, leaners, and edge-of-ROW overhang prior to dispatch. High-resolution, geotagged imagery (and, when approved, LiDAR) allows our planners to assess structural damage, estimate clearance needs, and produce orthomosaics that guide crew routing and access restoration.

HELICOPTERS

Helicopters can play a crucial role in disaster debris removal by providing rapid, flexible, and efficient access to areas that are otherwise inaccessible due to damaged infrastructure, blocked roads, or hazardous conditions. Their ability to maneuver in tight spaces allows them to efficiently transport personnel, heavy equipment, and essential supplies directly to affected areas. In situations where time is critical, helicopters can quickly air-lift debris or clear paths for emergency responders, accelerating the overall recovery process. Their utilization enhances the speed of both initial damage assessments and cleanup operations and helps ensure the safety of ground crews by reducing their exposure to the areas' unstable environments.

The photo to the right depicts DRC's use of a helicopter to quickly and safely remove derelict vessels from the mangroves in Fort Myers following Hurricane Ian without damaging the sensitive environment.

STATE & FEDERAL PROGRAMS

The Public Assistance Program of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is aimed at providing support and resources for disaster recovery efforts. These programs facilitate the reimbursement of eligible expenses incurred by state and local governments, as well as certain nonprofit organizations, following a federally declared disaster.

The Public Assistance Program and Policy Guide (PAPPG) is a comprehensive, consolidated program and policy document for FEMA's Public Assistance Program. DRC thoroughly reviews and follows the PAPPG. The latest version is FEMA Policy 104-009-2, Public Assistance Program and Policy Guide Version 5.0 (issued January 6, 2025). This latest PAPPG supersedes all previous policies and publications for disasters declared on or after January 6, 2025.

Within the State of Louisiana's Governor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness (GOHSEP), several programs are aligned with the FEMA Public Assistance Program. Key programs within GOHSEP that are aligned with the FEMA Public Assistance Program include the following:

- ✔ Public Assistance Grants
- ✔ Hazard Mitigation Grant Program
- ✔ Community Disaster Loans

These programs, modeled after FEMA's framework, demonstrate the State's commitment to leveraging federal resources and implementing effective strategies to mitigate the impact of disasters and support long-term recovery efforts across the state.

FUNDING SOURCES

After a natural disaster, FEMA Public Assistance applicants have access to various funding sources to support their recovery efforts. These funding sources include federal grants, state matching funds, hazard mitigation grants, Community Development Block Grants (CDBG), and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Funding. These funding sources provide crucial financial assistance to FEMA Public Assistance applicants, helping them rebuild and strengthen their communities in the aftermath of a natural disaster.

REIMBURSEMENT PROCESS

The FEMA Public Assistance reimbursement process is crucial for assisting applicants in recovering from disasters and restoring essential services to their communities. Key elements of this process include the following:

Eligibility Determination: FEMA evaluates the eligibility of projects submitted by applicants based on established criteria, including the type of work, its relationship to the disaster, and compliance with federal regulations.

Project Formulation: Applicants work with FEMA to develop detailed project worksheets that outline the scope of work, estimated costs, and supporting documentation for each eligible project.

Obligation of Funds: Once projects are approved, FEMA obligates funds to cover the federal share of eligible costs, up to 75% of the total project cost, with the applicant responsible for providing the non-federal match.

Documentation: Applicants must maintain accurate records and documentation throughout the project lifecycle, including procurement procedures, labor costs, equipment usage, and invoices, to support reimbursement claims.

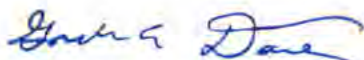

On behalf of the City of Baton Rouge/Parish of East Baton Rouge's Department of Environmental Services, it is my pleasure to submit this letter of recommendation for DRC Emergency Services.

DRC has been a trusted partner of our City-Parish for years, including and especially during one of the most catastrophic and costly events in the history of our state and country. In August 2016, when the floodwaters of the Great Flood of 2016 (DR-4277) began rising and threatening to inflict damage on tens of thousands of homes in East Baton Rouge Parish, DRC was quick to respond and react to our activation of the company's debris removal contract. In the days that immediately followed, DRC's team worked side-by-side with our senior leadership team at our emergency operations center to begin identifying the known extent of damage inflicted by this disaster, preparing routes and maps for rapid deployment across our parish once it was safe to do so, and immediately mobilizing their significant fleet of trucks to begin staging for debris removal operations. Less than a week after floodwaters began to recede from our area, DRC's fleet began to conduct our first debris removal pass, targeting seven initial ZIP codes that were impacted by the flooding event. DRC subsequently expanded operations to include all impacted ZIP codes and remained active through their final pass conducted in August 2017.

Throughout this timeframe, DRC's team was responsive, proactive, and communicative regarding any needs our City-Parish agencies, elected officials, or residents had related to our debris removal program, going above and beyond to ensure the public was informed about program activities at all times. For example, beginning in mid-September 2016, DRC staff along with our debris monitoring firm team joined City-Parish leaders in providing televised updates on debris removal activities each morning – both for the day ahead as well as upcoming deadlines or issues related to the program. These segments were broadcast live by local news media, on our government access channel Metro 21, and through our City-Parish Facebook page via Facebook Live. These daily updates continued for nearly a month and a half, and DRC's team was integral in developing and sharing updates to be shared with our residents that kept them informed and aware of program activities.

This same level of responsiveness, coordination, and resourcing on the part of DRC was present throughout the entirety of our debris removal program and recovery effort, ultimately resulting in nearly 2 million cubic yards of debris collected and representing one of the largest and most complex flood debris removal efforts in the history of the U.S. DRC's ability to mobilize their fleet and respond to needs, or proactively anticipate them, was critical to our program's success – including rapid scaling of their fleet to nearly 200 trucks on the streets each day at the height of the program's activity and daily debris collection totals approaching 50,000 cubic yards. Our Mayor's Office, Councilmembers, my office, and other coordinating agencies took great comfort in the "on the ground" presence and access they had to DRC's team throughout this effort, and their commitment to the job until we fully addressed all the recovery needs of our residents was greatly appreciated.

I strongly recommend DRC as a qualified and capable debris removal contractor that I feel confident will provide the same level of service, dedication, and passion for your recovery and/or clean-up effort as they did here in East Baton Rouge Parish. 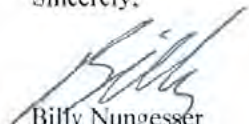

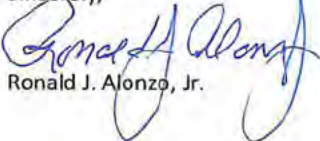

/ WORK PLAN/PROJECT APPROACH

OVERVIEW

Debris removal included within this contract will be completed by both water-based removal and land-based removal. DRC intends to utilize barges, airboats, marsh buggies (tracked vehicles), excavators, and skid steers to collect and gather debris from the water and the banks. Self-loading haul trucks will be utilized to haul collected debris to the final destination facility. Debris will be removed, processed and disposed of according to the type of debris stream. Vegetative and construction & demolition debris will be hauled to preapproved debris management site/final disposal sites.

DRC will determine number of crews needed and personnel per crew at the time of initial assessment.

PROJECT INITIATION AND MOBILIZATION

Upon receipt of the Notice to Proceed (NTP) from Acadia Parish, DRC will provide all required submittals within one (1) day. Within twenty-four (24) hours of receipt of the NTP, DRC will begin mobilizing personnel, equipment, and specialized waterborne assets to the project area.

Within forty-eight (48) hours of receipt of the NTP, DRC will conduct a preliminary inspection of the Parish's waterways to assess storm-related debris conditions, including fallen trees, snags, drifts, and other obstructions. This assessment will be used to estimate debris quantities, identify access and offloading locations, and determine the number of crews and equipment resources required to complete the work within the approved project schedule.

DEBRIS REMOVAL OPERATIONS

The project will require both debris removal via water and debris removal via access to the banks. Debris will be staged at extraction points adjacent to the waterways. Access/extraction points will be identified and approved. DRC may utilize timber matting at extraction points in order to facilitate access.

DRC will supply water transportation via power boat for the monitor and Parish where necessary at the work site.

In coordination and agreement with Acadia Parish, DRC will mobilize the number of debris removal

crews agreed upon for the project. Debris removal operations will begin within seventy-two (72) hours of receipt of the Notice to Proceed (NTP). Based on the results of the preliminary inspection and in continued



coordination with Acadia and its designated Technical Assistance contractor, additional crews and equipment will be mobilized as necessary to maintain production rates and ensure timely completion of the project.

Debris removal crews will consist of trained and certified personnel operating specialized waterborne equipment. Many crews will utilize self-propelled barges equipped with onboard knuckle-boom loaders capable of efficiently removing large storm debris from the channel. Barges will typically range in size from approximately 10 feet by 24 feet to 14 feet by 30 feet and will generally carry between 60 and 90 cubic yards of debris per load, depending on debris type and weight.

In some locations, barge-mounted knuckle-boom loaders will be used to load debris into empty barges staged nearby. This approach allows for continuous debris removal while minimizing impacts to the waterway and adjacent properties.



OFFLOADING, HAULING, AND DISPOSAL

Once fully loaded, barges will be transported to designated offloading points approved by the Parish and/or its Technical Assistance contractor. Debris will be off-loaded either directly into hauling units or temporarily stockpiled at approved dockside locations prior to trucking.

DRC will provide all trucking and hauling services necessary to transport debris from offloading locations to the Parish's approved Debris Disposal Site(s). All hauling and disposal activities will be conducted in compliance with Parish requirements and applicable environmental regulations.

PROTECTION OF PROPERTY AND ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

DRC will exercise reasonable care to avoid damage to personal property and adjacent infrastructure during debris removal operations. Any personal property encountered within the work area will be handled in accordance with landowner agreements and project specifications. DRC shall not be responsible for pre-existing or storm-related damage unless damage is determined to be the result of negligence.

All work will be performed using best management practices to minimize environmental impacts and maintain the integrity of wetlands and waterways in accordance with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers permit conditions.

PROJECT COMPLETION

DRC will continue debris removal, hauling, and disposal operations until all storm-related debris and obstructions identified within the project limits have been removed and the Acadia Parish waterways are restored in accordance with the approved plans and specifications. DRC will provide all professional services required to support construction, documentation, coordination, and compliance through final project closeout.

CANAL/WATERWAY DEBRIS REMOVAL



Canal debris removal is most often performed under the oversight of state environmental regulators, especially in environmentally sensitive areas. Environmental factors always take priority when developing an operations plan. Debris removal may be land-based or water-based. Collection methods vary widely due to physical dynamics, environmental considerations, regulations, and scope of work.

Targets can be identified by side-scan sonar or below surface observation. Target removal may span from the water bottom to surface debris, or it may be limited to designated depths.

When appropriate, debris can be collected with grapples mounted on barges of varying sizes or even small boats. Land-based operations consist of removal of targets with long reach excavators equipped with a spoils or dredge bucket.

Temporary Offloading Sites can be used to stage debris prior to transport to a Debris Management Site for processing or to final disposal. When abundant access points exist, loading can occur directly into trucks for transport to processing or disposal.

- DRC is currently contracted by the City of Houston for a multi-phase waterway debris removal project and has removed **2.2 million cubic yards** of debris from Houston waterways to date.
- In response to Hurricane Ida in 2021, DRC collected and disposed of **over 428,000 cubic yards** of debris from canals and waterways across 5 jurisdictions.

LAND-BASED DEBRIS REMOVAL

DRC will use excavators to collect and gather debris from the banks. In order to utilize the bank for extraction, DRC may need to remove trees at the designated access points. Trees along the banks needing to be cut will be done so with power saws. Debris will be offloaded into a self-loading truck. Vegetative debris (tree branches, leaves, logs, timber, stumps, etc.) will be loaded onto the self-loader directly from extraction points

adjacent to the banks and then hauled to a final disposal site.. Construction and Demolition debris (building materials, drywall, etc.) will be hauled directly to the Parish approved Final Disposal Site.

EQUIPMENT STAGING AREAS

Pre-identifying equipment staging areas allows DRC to mobilize resources quickly and reduce response time. Staging locations should be easily accessible from major roadways, located away from residential areas, provide sufficient space for equipment, and offer secure conditions where feasible.

DMS SELECTION

TEMPORARY OFFLOADING SITE IDENTIFICATION

DRC will coordinate with the Parish to identify temporary offloading sites to support efficient debris operations. DRC will obtain authorization from the property owner and utilize these locations as interim offloading points, allowing collection trucks to unload debris for transfer by hauling trucks to the **Parish-designated final disposal location**.

DEBRIS MANAGEMENT SITES

DRC will transport and deliver all collected debris in accordance with Parish direction and applicable regulatory requirements. **At the request of Acadia Parish**, DRC can also **identify and provide suitable Debris Management Site (DMS) locations** and deliver **full DMS operational services**, including site setup, management, reduction activities, and documentation, to support efficient debris removal and recovery operations.

IDENTIFYING PERMANENT DISPOSAL, TRANSFER, AND RECYCLING FACILITIES

DRC has agreements in place with most major disposal and recycling facilities in the area. Possible final disposal sites include the following:

DRC's management will be responsible for working with the Parish to identify these facilities and to secure favorable terms and conditions with each facility. Additionally, DRC's staff includes Jeff Snow and Tom Baker, experts in recycling, resource recovery, and disposal. With more than 30 years of experience, they bring expertise and exceptional knowledge to every project.

JOB SITE SECURITY

DRC will determine security needs on a case-by-case basis, in consultation with the Parish. Security on a debris removal site is a top priority for DRC, and several measures can be implemented to protect workers, the public, and nearby property. Only authorized personnel will have access to job sites.

Signage is one of the first lines of defense; clearly posted warning signs alert drivers and pedestrians to potential hazards, restricted areas, and heavy equipment zones.

Lighting is equally important, especially for early morning or evening operations, ensuring that workers can see clearly and that hazards are visible from a distance.

Fencing helps define the perimeter of the work zone, preventing unauthorized access and keeping debris contained within the site.

Gates provide controlled entry points for trucks and equipment, allowing site managers to monitor who enters and exits.

Security personnel play a key role in enforcing these measures; they oversee access control, monitor for safety violations, and deter theft or vandalism of equipment and materials.

Together, these security components create a controlled, well-organized environment that minimizes accidents, protects the public, and keeps operations running smoothly.

PROMPT DAMAGE RESOLUTION

- DRC maintains a damage hotline (888-721-4DRC) for all projects. A complaint manager is assigned to the project and is responsible for tracking all damage and repairs.
- DRC will investigate all damage complaints within 24 hours and will propose a resolution to the damaged party within 48 hours.

/ DOCUMENTATION & DATA MANAGEMENT

INVOICING PROCEDURE

DRC's invoicing procedure is as follows:

- Load tickets are received, logged, and then scanned into DRC's database system. Tickets are then entered and audited for accuracy.
- An invoice is created, along with the ticket data backup.
- The reconciliation process then takes place with either the Monitoring Firm or the reconciliation contact with the Parish.
- Once the invoice and ticket data have been 100% reconciled, the Monitoring Firm or the reconciliation contact with the jurisdiction recommends the invoice to FEMA for payment.
- Frequency: invoicing is usually performed on a biweekly basis.

DATA CENTER

DRC maintains a fully staffed, fully operational Data Center at its headquarters all year. The Data Center is staffed by experienced personnel with extensive knowledge of recording, reporting, contract, and reimbursement requirements. The Data Center is equipped with state-of-the-art information technology and is prepared to meet and exceed the reporting requirements of each client. All servers and networked computers are backed up both on and off-site every day. The urgent nature of DRC's work requires that the Company remain online and in contact across its network at all times.

DAILY REPORTS

DRC shall submit daily progress and quality control reports to the Parish for all activities. Each report will contain, at a minimum, the following information:

- Letterhead with DRC name and contact information
- Report Date
- Location of completed work
- Location of work for the next day
- Daily and cumulative hours for each piece of equipment and crew (Emergency Clearance)
- List of roads that were cleared (Emergency Clearance)
- Number of Crews (including number of trucks and loading equipment)
- Daily and cumulative totals of debris removed, by category
- Daily and cumulative totals of debris processed, to include method(s) of processing and disposal location(s)
- Daily estimate of hazardous waste debris segregated, and cumulative amount of hazardous waste placed in the designated holding area
- Number of hazardous trees and hanging limbs removed
- Problems encountered or anticipated and proposed solutions

Daily Reports are co-signed by the Parish's inspector to verify work performed. In addition, the Parish receives an original copy of all load tickets and receives and verifies for co-signature a Daily Reconciliation Sheet listing

each load ticket, truck number, crew number, street, truck volume, percent full, credited volume of debris removed, and the total volume removed for the day. This Daily Reconciliation Sheet can become the invoicing document for the contract.

DOCUMENTATION AND RECOVERY PROCESS

Prior to the beginning of hurricane season, DRC will meet with the Parish and the Debris Management Monitor to finalize and test the processes for inspection and documentation that are to be used during the response and recovery phases of debris removal. At all times, DRC will provide the Parish access to all work sites and disposal areas. DRC and the Debris Management Monitor will have personnel in place to verify and maintain records regarding the contents and cubic yards of the vehicles entering and leaving the site. The Debris Management Monitor will coordinate data recording and information management processes, including but not limited to the following:

- Prepare detailed estimates and submit to FEMA for use in Project Worksheet preparation.
- Implement and maintain a disaster debris management system linking load ticket and DMS information, including reconciliation and photographic documentation processes.
- Provide daily, weekly, or other periodic reports for the Parish managers and DRC, noting work progress and efficiency, current/revised estimates, project completion and other schedule forecasts/updates.

DRC will provide the following assistance:

- Create recovery process documentation plan
- Maintain documentation of recovery process
- Provide written and oral status reports as requested to the Parish and the Debris Management Monitor
- Review documentation for accuracy
- Assist in preparation of claim documentation

DRC understands that complete and accurate records are required for the receipt of federal funds. We will provide the Debris Management Monitor with all requested information that is necessary for proper documentation. DRC will work closely with FEMA and other applicable State and Federal agencies to ensure that eligible debris collection and data documenting appropriately address likely concerns of the reimbursement agencies.



/ COMMUNICATION & IN-FIELD TECHNOLOGY

COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY

Real-time communication is used to facilitate the field team's access to project resources and allow reporting by the field teams to program management. Radios/cell phones are used to initiate mobilization, support communication between the off-site and on-site personnel before utilities are established, and provide a means of ongoing communication with the site management team. Cellular technology has been fortified and reinforced over the past decade, and recent events have proven that even if cellular telephone capability is impacted, text messaging is almost always available due to the minimal bandwidth required. Should this technology fail, DRC has satellite radios, which can be deployed in a matter of hours. DRC's field staff also regularly use StarLink immediately after disasters to maintain lines of communication with our management and our clients. This technology mitigates any challenges that have previously arisen from disruptions to telecommunication services after a disaster.

IN-FIELD TECHNOLOGY

PROJECT MANAGER'S TOOLBOX

In the field, Project Managers utilize iPads to access DRC's Project Manager's Toolbox, an automated system which provides seamless real-time information exchange between office and field, no matter the size and scale of the project(s). The tool applies to all aspects of project management, including the following:

- Real-time damage and complaint reporting and resolution
- DMS reporting and site close out documentation
- Operations planning and daily reporting for client, monitor, and office
- Zone assignments and progress tracking
- Push Crew Tracking complete with time-stamped, geotagged photo backup

The toolbox replaces paper and endless emails with a secure database that utilizes Microsoft Multifactor authentication (MFA) and HIPAA compliant digital signatures.

MAPLINE

DRC utilizes innovative digital mapping technology to create custom maps specific to each project and jurisdiction. Maps may include any or all of the following:

- Equipment Staging Areas
- Collection Grids
- Landfills and DMS Locations
- Milage Radius for Tiered Hauling Distances

Mapline is utilized to optimize routing and send precise coordinates to operators in the field. Maps are updated in real time and are readily accessible in the field through phones and iPads.

/ CLIENT INTERACTION PROGRAM

At DRC we take very seriously the faith placed in our team upon selection by Acadia Parish as the Disaster Debris Management Provider. Having been the primary provider of services on some of the largest and most destructive events to ever impact our country, we appreciate and recognize the amount of information and interaction necessary for us to be completely prepared to provide the most effective debris removal program to Acadia Parish.

It is for this reason that the DRC Management and Operations Team spends as much time as is necessary working with local government leaders in times of non-event to gain that essential, in-depth understanding of local issues, priorities, concerns, and objectives, to provide a level of responsiveness that is unmatched in the industry. DRC's Regional Manager will meet regularly with Acadia Parish to discuss items such as DMS viability, priority roadways, critical access, and infrastructure concerns.

In any post-event scenario, participation by select Parish staff is critical. Parish employees, generally from Public Works or Solid Waste, provide direction and support pertaining to project approach, prioritization of push and collection routes, critical roadways and facilities, and physical nuances DRC might otherwise not know. DRC will begin to develop relationships with those responsible within the local government immediately upon contract award to establish and gain a deep understanding of the unique needs, concerns, and priorities of the Parish.

At no cost to the Parish, DRC will provide an annual "Pre-Season Debris Response & Readiness Workshop" whereby members of the Parish Debris Team, Public Works, and Finance & Administration can be updated on policy and guidance changes, roles and responsibilities of your debris management provider, and overall disaster debris educational training. These annual workshops have been immensely successful throughout the country, allowing the DRC team to interact with clients, share important information, and refresh local points of contact in the months leading up to hurricane season.

During times of post-event activation, DRC will engage the Parish staff and seek input continually, by way of daily meetings with all project participants, field interaction, and comprehensive daily reporting. This consistent interaction has successfully proven on past activations to keep critical lines of communication in place, provide complete transparency into the daily process, progress, challenges, and accomplishments, and provide early answers to the public and local government officials.

DRC firmly believes in serving clients year-round and not just at the time of an event or activation. Whether we are needed to respond to a minor contract activation or a large-scale catastrophic event, DRC believes that adequate planning and preparation are key to a successful and fully reimbursable debris removal program.

RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN DRC AND THE DEBRIS MANAGEMENT MONITOR

Building a positive working relationship between DRC and the debris management monitoring firm is crucial to the success of any project. For more than 20 years, DRC has worked with third party debris monitoring firms to achieve success in projects of all sizes. We have worked with nearly all of the debris management monitoring firms in the United States. Thus, it is very rare that DRC begins a debris project without already being familiar with the firm and their personnel.

As such, DRC has worked with the systems and software of all the major third-party monitoring firms. From manual ticketing to the more technical electronic tracking and ticketing systems, DRC has experience with every iteration existing today. DRC's understanding of the key elements of 44 CFR and FEMA 325 also enables DRC to operate congruently with the monitoring firm. DRC's team is prepared to work effectively with the Parish's chosen monitor.

POST EVENT EVALUATIONS

HOT WASH MEETINGS

DRC holds a Hot Wash with each jurisdiction post event. A Hot Wash is an after-action evaluation that occurs between DRC and the client. This post activation meeting serves as a forum for the client to discuss the project as a whole, the processes that were implemented, and any potential improvements. Additionally, DRC has an internal meeting to discuss development strategies and innovative concepts for future activations.

SUBCONTRACTOR EVALUATION

DRC has a large network of subcontractors and maintains long-standing relationships with trained and exclusively committed key subcontractors. Additionally, DRC strongly believes the use of local resources is vitally important to a successful disaster recovery operation. For decades, DRC has been building relationships with subcontractors across the nation. DRC utilizes a 55-point Post Event Subcontractor Evaluation Form to aid in building our reliable network of subcontractors.



/ SUSTAINABILITY

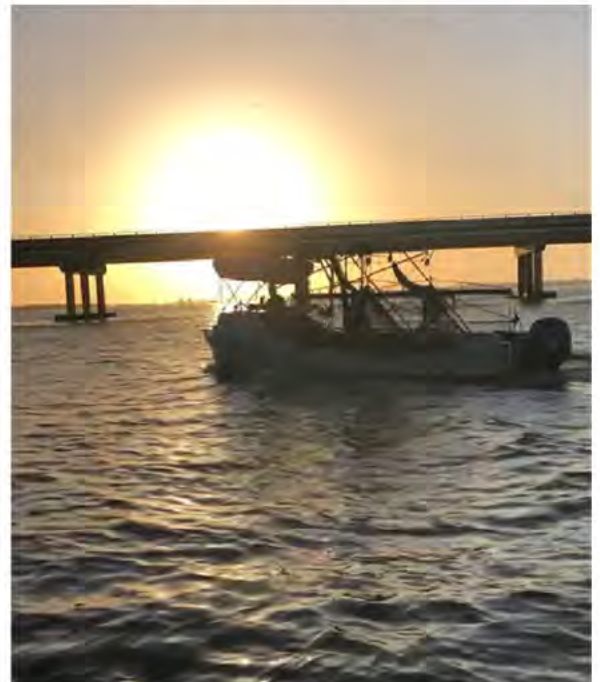
DRC is committed to the protection and restoration of communities and ecosystems affected by disasters. Although many of the events we respond to are caused by the forces of nature, these events often result in widespread environmental impacts. Moreover, the mitigation of these disasters, including the transportation and processing of large volumes of waste material, can have negative environmental impacts if not pursued with the care that defines DRC's work.

The removal of debris and waste materials, the restoration of damaged and compromised natural and constructed habitats, and in some cases the reconstruction of damaged coastal, marine, and wetland environments are the core missions in a DRC disaster response. Finally, DRC has embarked on a recycling program to ensure the most advantageous disposal of all the materials that we remove.

PROTECTING WILDLIFE IN ENVIRONMENTALLY SENSITIVE AREAS

DRC has a long history of successfully protecting wildlife and ecology in environmentally sensitive areas.

- In 2023, DRC removed sargassum from Sarasota beaches while coordinating with turtle surveyors and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection to implement proper procedures and ensure the protection of turtle nests.
- In 2021, DRC implemented measures to protect the local manatee population while performing marine debris removal, submerged vehicles removal, and the removal, screening, and placement of sand in Jefferson Parish, Louisiana. During this project, DRC mobilized 138 trucks on a single day.
- In 2008, DRC was activated in 23 Texas jurisdictions in the response to Hurricane Ike. Before commencing our debris removal operation in the ecologically sensitive coastal areas of Galveston Island, DRC staff received specialized training on how to protect the Kemp's Ridley Sea Turtle.



PINELLAS COUNTY RED TIDE

In 2018, DRC was activated in Pinellas County, Florida to remove and dispose of dead fish resulting from a one-million-acre red tide bloom in the Gulf of Mexico. A red tide bloom is caused by algae that produce toxins that kill aquatic life, make the surrounding air difficult to breathe, and often turn the water red. DRC efficiently removed over 3.6 million pounds of dead fish in a three-month span, using a variety of equipment. Shrimp boats were used to scoop up the dead fish offshore before they hit the beaches and inland waterways. For the fish that made it to shore, as well as into the canals, we implemented skimmer boats and beach rakes. DRC successfully cleaned and maintained 45 miles of coastline, keeping the beaches suitable for visitors. With the assistance of the United States Coast Guard, we were able to monitor the red tide plume's movement by helicopter, coordinating with the Florida Wildlife Commission as to the migration and effect of the algae. DRC and our partners on this project were awarded the 2018 Environmental Project of the Year by the West Coast Branch of the American Public Works Association.



BP DEEPWATER HORIZON OIL SPILL

DRC successfully performed in several contracts directly related to the oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico which flowed for three months in 2010. DRC conceived, executed, supervised, and funded a 150-mile Gulf of Mexico shoreline protection system in response to the oil spill. We relied on our depth of knowledge of debris handling in ecologically sensitive environments to guide the placement, management, and removal of oil containment boom. DRC staff had a personal interest in protecting the Gulf Coast as they were among the affected residents.

During this time, DRC was successfully classified as an Oil Spill Removal Organization (OSRO) by the United States Coast Guard. The company met several classifications which were listed on the OSRO Classification Matrix. Participation in this program allowed DRC to provide professionally recognized services to Escambia County, Florida as well as Plaquemines Parish, Terrebonne Parish, and Lafitte Parish, Louisiana.



DRC was tasked with designing coastal protective systems and unique collection programs along more than one hundred miles of estuaries in southwest Louisiana. The programs involved intensive employee training relative to the identification and protection of wildlife nesting and reproduction areas. DRC also played a role in setting up wildlife recovery and cleaning stations in Plaquemines Parish, Louisiana, where employees volunteered to help conduct rehabilitation and release programs.

RECYCLING

DRC has a wealth of experience performing landfill avoidance projects.

- Following Hurricane Ian in 2022, DRC was activated in 20 jurisdictions, managed 21 DMS sites, and removed and disposed of over five million cubic yards of debris in Sarasota County, Florida, and surrounding municipalities. DRC recycled 100% of the 3.3 million cubic yards of vegetative debris collected.
- In our response to Hurricane Ike in Houston in 2008, DRC recycled 100% of the more than five million cubic yards of vegetative debris we collected through a joint program with Republic Services. The material was used as alternative daily cover in landfills; as roadbed for temporary roads; as compost; and was given to citizens for use in landscaping. The same year in Galveston, DRC separated materials such as reusable wood, glass, metals, and drywall to achieve a high percentage of material reuse.
- DRC is pleased to have a formal partnership with Agromin, California's largest organics recycler. Agromin was voted Composter of the Year by the US Composting Council. All of the vegetative debris collected by DRC from California clients is composted and 100% recycled by Agromin. These materials are turned into rich soil to nourish agricultural land as well as for use by residents, municipalities, and landscapers throughout the state.

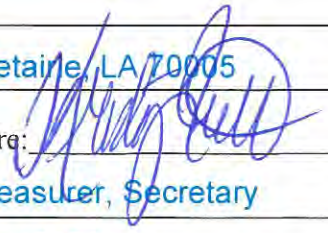
INSURANCE

DRC is one of the few companies in our industry to carry environmental insurance. While our operating procedures strictly adhere to environmental guidelines, the operation of DMS sites within a jurisdiction presents an element of potential exposure. The insurance held by DRC places an extra level of protection for the Parish that goes beyond the protection already provided through sound operating practices. FEDERAL CONTRACT COMPLIANCE (FEMA)

In the event performance of this Agreement will be funded in whole or in part by federal funds, the Contractor shall comply with the following provisions, as applicable:

[Federally Assisted Construction Contracts]

1. **Equal Employment Opportunity (41 C.F.R. Part 60)**. During the performance of this Agreement, the Contractor agrees as follows:

(a) The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or national origin. The Contractor will take affirmative steps to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or national origin. Such action shall include but not be limited to the following:

Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.

(b) The Contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or national origin.

(c) The Contractor will not discharge or in any other manner discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant has inquired about, discussed, or disclosed the compensation of the employee or applicant or another employee or applicant. This provision shall not apply to instances in which an employee who has access to the compensation information of other employees or applicants as part of such employee's essential job functions discloses the compensation of such other employees or applicants to individuals who do not otherwise have access to such information, unless such disclosure is in response to a formal complaint or charge, in furtherance of an investigation, proceeding, hearing, or action, including an investigation conducted by the employer, or is consistent with the Contractor's legal duty to furnish information.

(d) The Contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under this section, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

(e) The Contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

(f) The Contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations and orders.

(g) In the event of the Contractor's noncompliance with the non-discrimination clauses of this contract or with any of the said rules, regulations or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the Contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such further sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.

(h) The Contractor will include the foregoing provisions in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The Contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance. Provided, however, that in the event a Contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the administering agency, the Contractor may request the US to enter into such litigation to protect the interest of the US.

[Federally Assisted Construction Contracts in excess of \$2,000]

2. **Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 3141-3144 and 3146-3148).**

(a) All transactions regarding this agreement shall be in compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 3141-3144 and 3146-3148) and the requirements of 29 C.F.R. Part 5 as may be applicable. The Contractor shall comply with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 3141-3144 and 3146-3148) and the requirements of 29 C.F.R. Part 5 as applicable.

(b) Contractors are required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination by the Secretary of Labor. Additionally, Contractors are required to pay wages not less than once per week.

3. **Copeland Anti-Kickback Act (40 U.S.C. § 3145).**

(a) Contractor shall comply with 18 U.S.C. § 874, 40 U.S.C. § 3145, and the requirements of 29 C.F.R. Part 3 as may be applicable, which are incorporated by reference into this Agreement.

(b) The Contractor or subcontractor(s) shall insert in any subcontracts the clause above and such other clauses as FEMA may by appropriate instructions require, and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime Contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all of these contract clauses.

(c) A breach of the contract clauses above may be grounds for termination of the Agreement, and for debarment as provided in 29 C.F.R. § 5.12.

4. **Contract Work and Hours Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 3701-3708).**

(a) Overtime Requirements. No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work described herein which may require the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such employee in any workweek in which he/she is employed to work in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such employee receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of forty hours in such workweek.

(b) Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages. In the event of a violation of this section, the contractor and any subcontractor responsible therefor shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States (in the case of work performed under contract for the District of Columbia or a territory, to such District or territory), for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each employee employed in violation of this section, in the sum of \$26 for each calendar day on which such employee was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by this section.

(c) Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. The state or county shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in this section.

(d) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in this section and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in this section.

[Contracts awarded in excess of \$150,000 under a federal grant]

5. **Clean Air Act and Federal Water Pollution Control Act.**

(a) Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. §§ 7401, et seq.). The Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended. The Contractor agrees to report each violation to the County and understands and agrees that the County will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the FEMA, and the appropriate EPA Regional Office. The Contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with federal FEMA assistance.

(b) Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. §§ 1251, et seq.). The Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended. The Contractor agrees to report each violation to the County and understands and agrees that the County will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the FEMA, and the appropriate EPA Regional Office. The Contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with federal FEMA assistance.

6. **Debarment and Suspension.**

(a) In the event this Agreement is a "covered transaction" as defined in 2 C.F.R. Part. 180 and Part 3000, the contractor is required to verify that the contractor, its principals or affiliates, are not excluded (as defined in 2 C.F.R. § 180.940) or disqualified (as defined in 2 C.F.R. § 180.935).

(b) If applicable, the contractor must comply with 2 C.F.R. Part. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. Part 3000, subpart C, and must include a requirement to comply with these regulations in any lower tier covered transaction it enters into.

(c) This certification is a material representation of fact relied upon by the state and county. If it is later determined that the contractor did not comply with 2 C.F.R. Part 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. Part 3000, subpart C, in addition to remedies available to the state and county, the federal government may pursue available remedies, including but not limited to suspension and/or debarment.

(d) The bidder or proposer agrees to comply with the requirements of 2 C.F.R. Part 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. Part 3000, subpart C while any bid or proposal is valid and throughout the period of any Agreement that may arise therefrom. The bidder or proposer further agrees to include a provision requiring such compliance in its lower tier covered transactions.

[Contract of \$100,000 or more under a federal grant]

7. **Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment (31 U.S.C. § 1352).**

Contractors who apply or bid for an award of \$100,000 or more shall file the required certification (**APPENDIX A, 44 C.F.R. PART 18 - CERTIFICATION REGARDING LOBBYING**). Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not use federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an office or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any federal contract, grant, or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. § 1352. Each tier shall also disclose any lobbying with non-federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the recipient who in turn will forward the certifications to the awarding agency.

8. **Procurement of Recovered Materials.**

(a) In the performance of this Agreement, the Contractor shall make maximum use of products containing recovered materials that are EPA designated items unless the product cannot be acquired: competitively within a timeframe providing for compliance with the contract performance schedule; meeting contract performance requirements; or at a reasonable price. Information about this requirement, along with a list of EPA designated items, is available at EPA's Comprehensive Procurement Guidelines website, <https://www.epa.gov/smm/comprehensive-procurement-guideline-cpq-program>

(b) The Contractor also agrees to comply with all other applicable requirements of Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act.

9. **Procurement of Recovered Materials (2 C.F.R. § 200.323).** A non-Federal entity that is a state agency or agency of a political subdivision of a state and its contractors must comply with Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. The requirements of Section 6002 include procuring only items designated in guidelines of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) at 40 C.F.R. Part 247 that contain the highest percentage of recovered materials practicable, consistent with maintaining a satisfactory level of competition, where the purchase price of the item exceeds \$10,000 or the value of the quantity acquired during the preceding fiscal year exceeded \$10,000; procuring solid waste management services in a manner that maximizes energy and resource recovery; and establishing an affirmative procurement program for procurement of recovered materials identified in the EPA guidelines.

10. **Prohibition on Covered Telecommunications Equipment/Services (2 C.F.R. § 200.216).**

(a) Pursuant to Section 889, Public Law No.: 115-232 and 2 C.F.R. § 200.216, the recipient, its contractors and subcontractors may not use loan or grant funds from the federal awarding agency to: (1) procure or obtain any equipment, system, or service that uses covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology of a system; (2) enter, extend, or renew a contract to procure or obtain equipment, system, or service that uses covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology of a system; (3) enter, extend or renew contracts with entities that use covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology of a system; or (4) provide, as part of its performance of contract, subcontract, or other contractual instrument, any equipment, system, or service that uses covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology of a system.

(b) This provision shall not be construed to: (a) prohibit a contractor from providing a service that connects to the facilities of a third-party, such as backhaul, roaming, or interconnection arrangements; or (b) cover telecommunications equipment that cannot route or redirect user data traffic or permit visibility into any user data or packets that such equipment transmits or otherwise handles. By necessary implication and regulation, the prohibitions also do not apply to: covered telecommunications equipment or services that are not used as a substantial or essential component of any system and are not used as critical technology of any system; or other telecommunications equipment or services that are not considered covered telecommunications equipment or services.

(c) As described in Section 889, Public Law No.: 115-232, “covered telecommunications equipment or services” means any of the following: (1) Telecommunications equipment produced by Huawei Technologies Company or ZTE Corporation (or any subsidiary or affiliate of such entities); (2) For the purpose of public safety, security of government facilities, physical security surveillance of critical infrastructure, and other national security purposes, video surveillance and telecommunications equipment produced by Hytera Communications Corporation, Hangzhou Hikvision Digital Technology Company, or Dahua Technology Company (or any subsidiary or affiliate of such entities); (3) Telecommunications or video surveillance services provided by such entities or using such equipment; (4) Telecommunications or video surveillance equipment or services produced or provided by an entity that the Secretary of Defense, in consultation with the Director of the National Intelligence or the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, reasonably believes to be an entity owned or controlled by, or otherwise connected to, the government of a covered foreign country; and (5) systems that use covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology as part of any system.

(d) If the contractor identifies covered telecommunications equipment or services used as a substantial or essential component of any system or as critical technology as part of any system, during the performance of the agreement, or contractor is notified of such by a subcontractor at any tier or by any other source, the contractor shall report the information to the FEMA funding recipient. The Contractor shall report the following information:

Within one business day from the date of such identification or notification: Contract Number; order number(s); supplier name; supplier unique entity identifier; supplier Commercial and Government Entity (CAGE) code; brand; model; model number; item description; and any readily available information about mitigation actions undertaken or recommended.

Within 10 business days of submitting the aforementioned information: Any further available information about mitigation actions undertaken or recommended. In addition, the contractor shall describe the efforts it undertook to prevent future use or submission of covered telecommunications equipment or services.

(e) The Contractor shall insert the substance of this section, including this paragraph (e) in all subcontracts and other contractual instruments.

11. **Domestic Preferences for Procurements (2 C.F.R. § 200.322)**. 15. **Compliance with Federal Law, Regulations, and Executive Orders.** Contractor hereby acknowledges that all or a portion of this Agreement may be funded by Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) financial assistance. Contractor shall comply with all applicable Federal laws, regulations, executive orders, and FEMA policies, procedures and directives.
16. **No Obligation.** The Federal Government is not a party to this Agreement and is not subject to any obligations or liabilities to the County, Contractor, or any other party pertaining to any matter arising out of this Agreement.
17. **Program Fraud and False or Fraudulent Statements or Related Acts.** Contractor acknowledges that 31 U.S.C. Chapter 38 (Administrative Remedies for False Claims and Statements) applies to its actions pertaining to this Agreement.
18. **Rights to Inventions.** If the federal award meets the definition of a “funding agreement” under 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) and the recipient wishes to enter into contract with a small business firm or non-profit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment, or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under the “funding agreement,” the recipient must comply with the requirements of 37 C.F.R. Part 401 and any implementing regulations issued by FEMA.
19. **Copyright and Data Rights.** Contractor grants to the County a paid up, royalty free, nonexclusive, irrevocable, worldwide license in data first produced in the performance of this contract to reproduce, publish or otherwise use, including prepare derivative works, distribute copies to the public, and perform publicly and display publicly such data. For data required by the contract but not first produced in the performance of this contract, the Contractor will identify such data and grant to the County or acquire on its behalf a license of the same scope as for data first produced in the performance of this contract. Data, as used herein, shall include any work subject to copyright under 17 U.S.C. § 102, for example, any written reports or literary works, software or source code, music, choreography, pictures or images, graphics, sculptures, videos, motion pictures or other audio-visual works, sound or video recordings, or architectural works. Upon or before the completion of this contract, Contractor will deliver to the County data first produced in the performance of this contract and data required by this contract but not first produced in the performance of this contract in formats acceptable by the County.

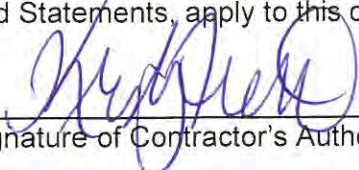

For the purposes of this section, “covered telecommunications equipment or services” also include systems that use covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology as part of any system.

(M) Domestic Preferences for Procurements (2 C.F.R. § 200.322). 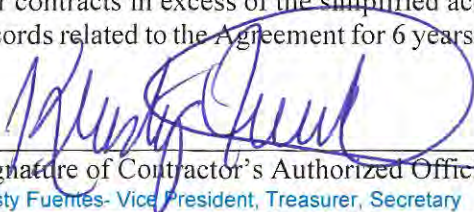

For contracts in excess of the simplified acquisition threshold, Contractor shall provide for retention of all records related to the Agreement for 6 years after receiving final payment and all pending matters are closed.

Response: This contract is for current FEMA-funded hurricane waterway debris removal work.

3. I noticed there are no quantities- is there another formula, or how will the lowest bidder be determined?

Response: Proposals will be evaluated in accordance with the RFP criteria.

Response: Contractors may propose appropriate equipment, provided all work complies with applicable permits, site conditions, and Parish approval.

What is your budget?

Response: The current project budget is approximately \$2.8 million, but is subject to adjustment as the work requires to clear the Hurricane Debris.

What is the funding source?

Response: This is a FEMA-funded project with Parish cost share.

Is Rostan the monitoring firm for the project? If not, who is the monitoring firm?

Response: Monitoring may be handled by the Parish's Pre-positioned Monitoring Contractor, Tetra Tech.

1. Is a Louisiana contractor's license required in order to submit a bid/proposal for this RFP?

Response: Contractors are responsible for obtaining and maintaining all licenses and permits required to perform the work in the State of Louisiana.

2. What bonding is required for this RFP, including the required bid bond amount and any performance/payment bond requirements after award?

Response: Bidders shall submit a letter of bonding capability. The awarded contractor will be required to provide bonding for the amount allocated to each Task Order.

3. Have any addenda been issued during the RFP period? If so, please provide copies or direct us to where they can be accessed.

Response: Yes. Addenda are posted on Central Bidding and the Acadia Parish Police Jury website. There are currently two addenda: 1) Clarifies the Mandatory Site Visit Location; 2) Posting of the sign-in sheet for the Mandatory Site Visit.

Per Section 5.3 Required Submittals, please confirm whether Item #7 (Bonding Letter) is required to include a bid bond, or if a bonding letter alone satisfies this requirement.

Response: Item #7 requires that bidders submit a letter of bonding capability. The awarded contractor will be required to provide bonding for the amount allocated to each Task Order.

Are we to remove undamaged trees if they are obstructing the waterway?

Response: No. This project is for storm-damaged trees and debris. There will be a monitoring firm present for all work and eligibility compliance.

When the ditch is so narrow that you must use low impact land-based equipment from the top of bank, who will be responsible for ROEs?

Response: The awarded contractor shall obtain ROE's.

Are we being sent to each debris point? or are we to traverse the waterways with debris points in them, and remove all eligible debris?

Response: The awarded Contractor will be instructed and evaluated on completed sections of waterways. The goal is to maximize impact and eligible debris removal rather than perform point-to-point removal.

Pertaining to paragraph 1.3.8: Debris Classification:

1. One condition is “Has a diameter breast height of six inches or greater”--Does this mean all trees larger than 6 inches diameter breast height will be removed?

Response: No. This project is for removal of storm-damaged trees and eligible hurricane-related debris only. A monitoring firm will be present to document eligibility.

2. One condition is “Trees leaning at an angle of 30 degrees or greater and limbs hanging” — Are we to remove trees leaning at 30 degrees or greater regardless of the limbs? If not, what defines ‘limbs hanging’?

Response: Eligibility determinations will be made on a tree-by-tree basis by the Parish's debris monitoring firm. This project is for storm-damaged trees and debris only. A monitoring firm will be present for all work and eligibility compliance.

1)SoW only mentions grinding as reduction method for vegetative debris; is air curtain or open burning an allowed reduction method as well?

Response: For the purpose of this RFP, please bid the line item for reduction as specified in the RFP.

2) In addition to barges, are marsh buggies designed to create minimal ground pressure allowed to be used within the waterways?

Response: Contractors may propose appropriate equipment, provided all work complies with applicable permits, site conditions, and Parish approval.

3) What is the potential total linear feet/miles of waterways within the parish?

Response: At this time, there is no linear feet/miles available. After award of successful contractor, the Parish will work with awardee to maximize the impact for the community to alleviate health and safety concerns.

4) Are there any established pre-approved access/debris staging sites along the waterways?

Response: The awarded contractor shall secure DMS and disposal sites subject to Parish approval and all applicable permit requirements. There are access points identified in the permit documents, however, the awarded contractor will be responsible for ROE's as well as ensuring those are acceptable areas for use.

This Addendum forms part of the Contract Documents and modifies the original Request for Proposals (RFP) as described herein.

All other terms, conditions, and requirements of the original RFP remain unchanged.

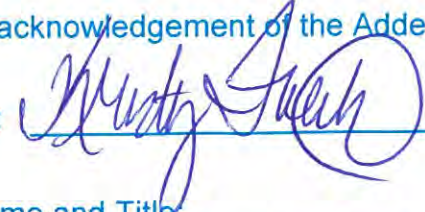
